There are many important factors to consider when reviewing candidates, but for those with a conservative biblical worldview our highest priorities are essential core values such as the sanctity of life, biblical marriage, sexuality and gender, parental rights, religious liberty, proper role of (and generally smaller) government, and lower taxes so that families and businesses can thrive. Other considerations include electability, character (to the extent that this can be known) and experience.

Remember, there are no "perfect" candidates and sometimes none of the candidates in a race hold a biblical worldview. Try not to think in terms of voting for the lesser of evils, but of voting for candidates who would do the greater good in office (or the least damage). Some of these choices are not "conservatives," but the *more* conservative of the candidates in the race. *Keep in mind that if you prefer not to vote for any candidate in a particular contest, leaving an office blank does not invalidate your ballot.* Also, if there are multiple open seats, focus on the conservatives, even if it's just one.

I am not including Democrat Central Committee races, because the <u>platform</u> of that party so clearly deviates from the important values of life, sexuality, gender, parental rights and the traditional family. While conservative Democrats are rare, I may indicate in a race between them that one may be more conservative than the other(s).

Above all, do not forsake the polls! We must participate in the process, even if there's not a race or issue that excites us. There are good people on every ballot who deserve our support. You may leave some races blank. That's okay! Please vote wisely and pray that candidates who hold to biblical values and who will lead with integrity are successful. And please be careful with your ballot. While you may vote by mail, the most secure way is **in person** at a Vote Center*. You may complete the ballot you were mailed and take it with you. You must go through the check-in process, then the poll worker will give you a secrecy sleeve for your ballot. If you brought your envelope with you, they can destroy it for you. They will then place your ballot through the secrecy sleeve into the ballot box at the check-out station. You may also check in and surrender your ballot. You'll then use the ballot marking device to print your ballot with your choices, placing it in a secrecy sleeve and giving it to the poll worker to place in the ballot box. Be sure to track your ballot. Sign up for BallotTrax at california.ballottrax.net/voter/.

*Some vote centers will be open for 11 days and all vote center locations will be open 4 days including Election Day. I suggest voting on Election Day or very near it, not only for security, but also because sometimes new information about candidates becomes available in the weeks prior to the election.

The following are my *personal* recommendations and not those of any organization(s) with which I am involved. In making these choices I use nonpartisan and candidate websites, organizational endorsements, voter guides, print and online media sources, interviews with various trusted sources, forums, and, sometimes, personal vetting or surveys with the candidate or campaign. (Please see "<u>Valuable Voter Resources</u>" below to help you do your *own* research.)

NOTE:

- 1) An asterisk (*) denotes an incumbent.
- 2) Not all candidates listed share a biblical worldview on core principles, but many do and all are those I consider to be the *best of the available choices*.
- 3) If I have no recommendation for an office, I may note information that could aid your decision. In cases where I have little information about candidates, but they are endorsed by the GOP, I will note that as "GOP-endorsed."

Federal Offices

President

Just two candidates remain in the Republican Presidential race, though more names appear on the ballot. Polls definitely favor Donald Trump and he will likely move to the General Election. If he does, let's resolve to pray that he will fervently seek the Lord and learn to walk in humility and wisdom.

U.S. Senate - Full Term

Steve Garvey – The former Dodger hasn't discussed social issues much on the campaign trail—though he has spoken favorably toward parental rights and choice in education. While Eric Early has articulated many conservative views on key issues, and he may be more conservative than Garvey, the only conservative of any kind who has the chance to reach the second of the top two spots going into November's General Election is Steve Garvey. Therefore, I suggest voting for him.

Republican Central Committees

This is a very important office. The Central Committee determines Party endorsements, supports candidates and campaigns, helps to get out the vote and more. In each district there are many good conservative candidates running. In some, there are three times as many candidates as there are seats! Thus, it's very difficult to narrow the field to the nine seats available – and these choices have been difficult. I like quite a few more candidates than are listed. So, because many of you may know at least one of the folks running for this important office, use my choices as a guide. Remember, you are not required to vote for nine. Vote for those you feel will best represent your views in endorsing good candidates.
